Another year of reinvention.

The pandemic continued to throw curve balls as we adjusted to revolving closures, reopenings, and restrictions. We capitalized on the chance to reinvent how we serve the community. Here are a few of our great news stories of 2021.

CELEBRATING BLACK HISTORIES AND FUTURES

The rich history, heritage, and literary talents of Black people were celebrated online in February. Acclaimed beat-box artist Sean Mauricette a.k.a. SUBLIMINAL shared powerful stories on Black excellence throughout history. Lisa Meecham explored the deep connection between Black heritage in early Atlantic Canada and the craft of traditional rug hooking.

COMMUNITY FRIDGE

To help support local residents in need, our Aldershot Branch became Burlington's first community fridge location. Twice weekly, Food for Life volunteers stock the fridge with nutritious food for neighbourhood residents to take when they need it.

STORYWALKS

We launched six StoryWalks in spring 2021, together with the City of Burlington's Recreation, Community and Culture department. Situated in six community parks, these beautifully illustrated poster-size picture books can be enjoyed by everyone as readers travel from sign to sign to read an engaging story.

PRIDE ON DISPLAY

We transformed Central's Great Hall windows into a bold and bright, super-sized Pride flag for June, and partnered with PFlag Halton to encourage 2SLGBTQIA+ individuals and allies to Show Your Pride online. As well, Luna M. Ferguson's book Me, Myself, They: Life Beyond the Binary was featured at a book club talk hosted by Halton Equity & Diversity Roundtable and the four public libraries in Halton Region.

EVEN MORE TO BORROW

London and Ottawa Public Libraries joined our OverDrive digital partnership with Mississauga Library and Hamilton Public Library (HPL), bringing our total digital collection to 330,000+ titles. And in June, BPL members got full borrowing privileges of HPL's print books, movies, music, magazines, video games and more!

WRITING THE ROLLERCOASTER

Local authors Sylvia McNicol and Lynda Simmons generously brought Burlington and BPL along for their *Writing the Rollercoaster* project. They helped residents write about their pandemic experiences—and what a ride that was! The contributions evolved into a published book, and free copies were available for anyone to pick up at our branches.

BURLINGTON LITERARY FESTIVAL



HALTON CLIMATE COLLECTIVE READS


